Died John Ambrose Ellis Knight, son of M.J. and C.A. Knight, was born in Lunenbergh county VA August 5th 1828. Came to Missouri with his father when about fourteen years old, moved to Texas when nineteen. He crossed the Staked Plains with an outfit to open a road to Santa Fe Mexico from there to Chihuahua and back to Texas, went to Missouri in 1849 to California in 1850, back through Arizona to Missouri in 1851. He was married to Lucy Dinning the same year, and moved back to California in 1852, staid there until after his wife's death in 1861, went to Oregon, traveled all over California and Oregon, traded cattle and run a pack train to the mines, at intervals, from 1852 until 1863. Married his last wife who was Mrs. Henrietta Chiles widow of J.B. Chiles, and daughter of Thos. W. Mercer of Independence, Missouri and with her and his children moved back to Texas, passing through Oregon, California, New Mexico, Colorado and Kansas. He got to Texas in October, 1866. Since that time he has been identified with the cattle and ranche business, having driven cattle to all the territories north and shipped to Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and other places, both horses and cattle, and for the last ten years has been living in Palo Pinto County. Prior to coming here he lived in Fort Worth twelve years.

The subject of this memoir has been in bad health for eighteen months, he was prostrated with inflammation of the bowels, about ten o'clock Thursday and died about four o'clock Monday morning, April 30, 1894.

A good citizen, a kind husband and a loving, indulgent father has fallen asleep. He was generous to a fault and bore no malice toward any man. He expressed himself, before he died, as never having wronged any man. No traveler was ever turned from his door, and he always fed the hungry. Many a time have he and his good wife made

It seems that while driving some cattle on horseback, the animal began to pitch and threw Mr. Lasater who fell upon his head, bursting his skill, from the effects of which he died Tuesday evening at 8:30 p.m. Mr. Lasater was born in Grayson county, Texas, Sept 21, 1852, and moved to this county when he was three years old and has been identified with the cattle business ever since. He has to a number of years been engaged in farming and stock raising, and was one among our most prominent citizens. On the 8th inst, he was elected sheriff of this county, but did not live to receive even legal notice of his election as he died before the votes were counted by the Commissioners court. He was a consistent member of the Methodist church, and for a number of years he has employed his time and talents for the promotion of the standard of morality and Christianity among his neighbors and friends. He was held in high esteem by those who differed with him politically and though they did what they could to defeat him in the recent election, they held no personal malice and regarded him as a straightforward and honorable gentleman. Dr. Lennox had become involved in a number of unfortunate difficulties, but was in no sense a desperado—he had warm friends, was generous and impulsive, and possessed of no more than the ordinary failings of humanity. Suicide Last Saturday morning the body of an unknown man who had committed suicide was brought in from a camp about a mile south of town near the fair grounds. He had been in the town the day before trying to get work but failed, and on Friday evening he had stopped at the camp of some freighters and asked to stay overnight, which was granted. During the night the party were awakened by the sound of groans and going to his bed found him in violent convulsions. They attempted to alleviate his sufferings, but he begged them to let him alone, telling them that nothing serious was the matter, that he had been that way before and would soon be all right. After a while he became quiet, and his companions again went to sleep. The next morning he was lying on his face by the side of his bed, stark and still in the embrace of death. In his pocket book was found a small druggist's envelope labeled. "Poison" which contained a quantity of Crystals of Strychnine, one of the most deadly and virulent poisons known to the modern chemist. The envelope had been torn open at one corner and one of the party remembered to have see him taking some kind of medicine from his valise the evening previous. There is not the lightest doubt, but that his death was the result of the poison which his own hand administered. The spasmodic contractions of the muscles, constriction of the throat, and violet contortions of the neck and spinal column, all unmistakable symptoms peculiar to the toxicology of the fatal drug, left little doubt as to the immediate cause of his death. A small pocket diary was found on his person which contained the following entry:

Fort Worth, July 8-Tomorrow I will be on the move. My God will this never end! In another place was written,

"My name is James Maddox. For further information address James Maddox,

Fort Worth, Texas.

The day before his death he had given his name as **James Arnold** but it is thought that it was assumed, and that his real name was Maddox.

No other papers were found which could furnish a clue to his identity. He was a man of medium height, heavy set, of florid complexion, and had a light sandy moustache, through that he came from Louisiana. Exponent 21 Jul 1877

She was brought to Alabama from South Carolina by Mr. John McClurkin, father of

J.H. McClurkin, about forty years ago, and after the war married a colored man named Pyles. The fact that she really reached the age mention was duly authenticated. Mr. John McClurkin was one of the oldest and best known residents of Silver Run, Talladega county, Alabama. He died the 22 day of last October, and after his death his son decided to come to the Lone Star State. He tells us that in the old state he never felt as if he could afford to send all his children to school, but now all of them, six in number, are attending regularly.
